ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE, OF THE TOWN OF SCARBOROUGH,

FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 1st, 1854.

In compliance with the requirements of the Statute, the School Committee ask leave to submit the following "Report of the standing of, and progress made in the several Schools, in the various branches of learning therein taught, and the success which may have attended the mode of instruction and government of their respective Teachers" in this Town.

DISTRICT No. 9 .- COLLINS.

Miss Olive F. Sanborn, Tencher. She is a coung to cher and her shoul small; it appeared well conducted when visited, and at the close showed that mod improvement had been made, especially in reading.

WINTER TERM.

This School was under the instruction of Walter Haines, of Saco. The scholars appeared to take a deep interest in their studies, and made good improvement.

DISTRICT No. 4 .- BLUE POINT.

Miss Mary E. Chase, Teacher. The deportment of the scholars was satisfactory, a spirit of activity and interest appeared to be manifested at the commencement, which promised well for the fature: Although requested, was unable to visit the school at the close, therefore am not able to report the improvement except in writing which was decidedly good.

Winter term not visited.

DISTRICT No. 13.

Miss Knight, Teacher, who has taught in this district for several successive summer terms, and has given, we believe, general satisfaction. The teacher appeared acquainted with the duties of her office, and the general appearance of the school was satisfactory; and we were pleased to observe that the small scholars received a due share of the teacher's attention. We were serry to learn that many of the scholars were irregular in their attendance.

It is a question whether this want of attendance is occasioned by necessary causes, rather than some lack of interest on the part of parents in keeping their

children constantly at school.

WINTER TERM.

Mr. George H. Brooks, of Buxton, Teacher. The winter school hardly came up to the mark. The teacher appeared wanting in experience for the management of a school. The school was orderly, but it was the order of dulness and

want of interest which the teacher did not possess sufficient energy to awaken. Yet considerable improvement was made in some branches, particularly Geography.

DISTRICT No. 6 .- SCOTTOWS HILL.

Miss Lucy Hunnewell, Teacher. This school was characterized by remarkably good discipline, and we deem it our duty to say that for those qualifications which are requisite for a first rate teacher, Miss Hunnewell has no superior who has taught in town the present summer. Under the care of such a teacher the scholars made rapid and thorough progress, thereby maintaining the former high reputation of this school.

WINTER TERM.

Mr. Washington Tibbetts, Teacher. The school was not in so good a condition as we could have desired. A few of the scholars appeared well, but the greater part appeared inattentive, restless and disinterested. The same impediment that existed in No. 13, also existed here, viz: a want of ability and energy on the part of the teacher, to excite an interest in his pupils. We were not notified at the close, consequently are mable to report the progress of the school.

DISTRICT No. 10 .- BROAD TURN.

SUMMER TERM.

Miss Statira Staples, Teacher. The teacher labored unceasingly, and each scholar appeared to love their teacher and school, and the most seemed resolved to do all that could be done to render the school profitable to each, and the labor of those who attended regularly was crowned with success.

WINTER TERM.

This term was taught by Grenville McKenney. Most of the scholars were punctual, and their attendance regular, and the manner that they attended to their studies, was an indication that they not only appreciated the value of an education, but were determined to empty their privileges to obtain it. The improvement was gratifying to their teacher, and a credit to themselves.

DISTRICT No. 5.-DUNSTON.

Miss Hester Fabyan, Teacher. The school was only visited at the commencement. The scholars appeared interested, and the general appearance of the school was satisfactory.

WINTER TERM,

Was taught by Mr. Freedom Moulton, an able and experienced teacher. School not visited, owing to the neglect of Agent and Teacher to notify the Committee.

DISTRICT No. 3.

Miss Rosanna Hunnewell, Teacher. We were pleased with the management of this school, and a praiseworthy interest appeared to be manifested by the scholars, which promised well for the future.

WINTER TERM:

Mr. S. L. Small of Limington, Teacher. The school was not so successful as we had hoped. The scholars needed encouragement from the teacher and from their parents by way of a better house, but as neither gave them credit of what they deserved, they did not make that improvement they otherwise might have done.

DISTRICT No. 2.

Miss Amanda Leavitt, Teacher. The school was in good condition, pupils were well classed and appeared to be interested in their studies, so that the school was very satisfactory.

WINTER TERM.

Mr. William Leavitt of Buxton, Teacher. Visited near the close, and found it in all respects to be an excellent school. The scholars that attended the summer school had made rapid progress. Should consider him a first rate teacher.

DISTRICT No. 11.

Miss Ellen B. Cummings, Teacher. This was the first school this teacher ever taught, good discipline, pupils well interested in their several studies, and made good progress during the school.

DISTRICT No. 12 .- BABB.

Miss Mary J. Deering, Teacher. This school was well conducted, orderly, and made good progress.

WINTER TERM.

Mr. John F. Bean, Teacher. This school was characterized by the same good order and interest which attended it in the summer, and good proficiency was made.

DISTRICT NO. 7.—BEACH RIDGE.

Miss Martha Libby, Teacher. The school appeared well at both visits, and the general appearance of the school was highly satisfactory; and at the close there was evidence of good improvement.

WINTER TERM.

Mr. Alfred Wight of Casco, Teacher. In she early part of the term, a difference of opinion occured between the teacher and a part of the district in regard to discipline. The difficulty, instead of any probability of its being overcome, continued to spread so as to impair the usefulness of the school, and cause it to become a very unprofitable one. This being the state of affairs, your Committee deemed it their duty to discontinue the school. In this connection we consider it our duty to say, that in our opinion, no school can attain to any degree of improvement where there is a want of harmony and unanimity in the listrict; and we would endeavor to impress it upon the parents of every district, and particularly upon Beach Ridge, that the bert interest of their children are most regarded, when in important school matter mere personal feeling is entirally thrown aside.

There are many important considerations which might be presented, touching our common schools, but with a few suggestions, we close. We would urge upon the agents of the several districts the necessity, at the earliest opportunity, of securing the services of able and efficient teachers. Teachers who are firm and energetic, who are disposed to assist their pupils, and understand the art of teaching, and will not sacrifice the scholar's good for their own ease. But it may be said that it is the duty of the Committee to inquire into the competency of teachers, but there may be a vast difference between the best qualified and experienced teacher, and one who has barely passed an examination.

We think it our duty to remark here, that no teacher should be allowed to commence a school until the dertificate has been granted by the Committee, and produced to the agent, as two schools have not only commenced, but have been kept without any certificate. And in order that the schools may be more fully reported in future, we would have agents carefully observe the statute in regard to notifying the Committee at the commencement and at the close of a school.

The responsibility of Parents in respect to our schools is not fully realized by them. It rests with them to decide whether they will have efficient teachers and good schools, or inefficient teachers and poor schools; whether they will have comfortable and commodious school houses, or houses that are a standing disgrace to them. If there is anything about which Parents ought and should be deeply interested, it is the education of their children. It is believed if Parents were aware of how much of their hard earned money was poorly expended by not keeping their children constantly at school, they would feel that something should be done to remedy the evil. We think Parents ought to visit the schools attended by their children in order to become acquainted with the general management of the teachers. Again, it may be said it is the duty of the Committee to attend to this business. True, the Committee are required to visit each school at the commencement and at the close. But this is not enough. Let each Parent devote one day at least in visiting the schools during the sum-

mer and winter term. It is believed that this would tend to promote order and improvement of the school, and stimulate both teacher and scholar in their

works, and awaken a fresh interest in the school.

And let us remember that the prosperity of our country, the stability of our free republican government, and the happiness of the rising generation, depend almost entirely upon our Free School System in educating the mass of people. Let our Free School System be abandoned, and children suffered to grow up in ignorance, and the people of our Country would not be fit to govern themselves; and our excellent government, where the power is vested in the hands of the people, would be at the disposal of an aristocracy or a monarchy. None but an enlightened and virtuous people can long maintain a republican government like our own. Let us therefore as we care for our country and our free institutions, and as we desire the welfare of our children, do all in our power for the improvement of our schools.
