

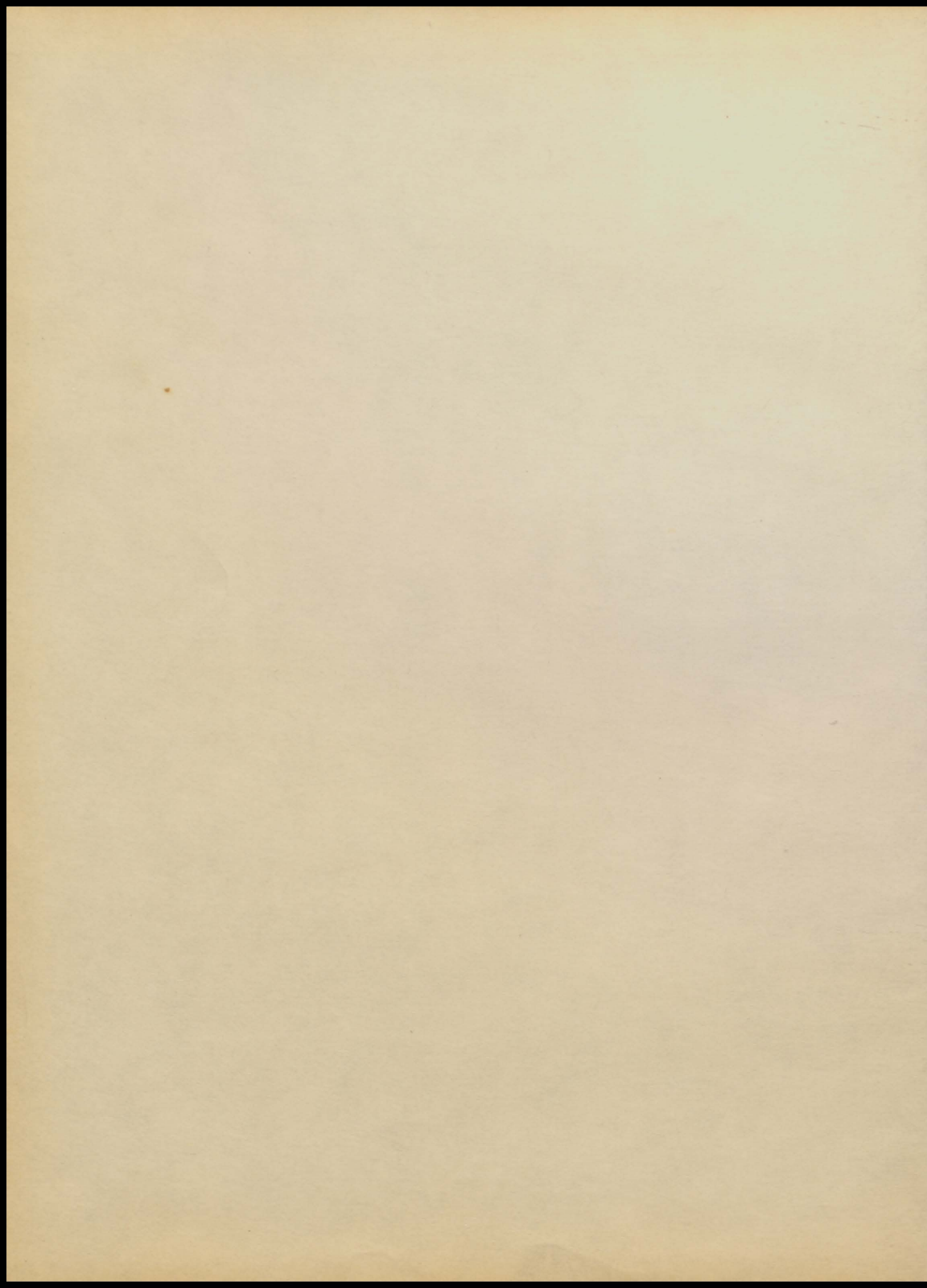



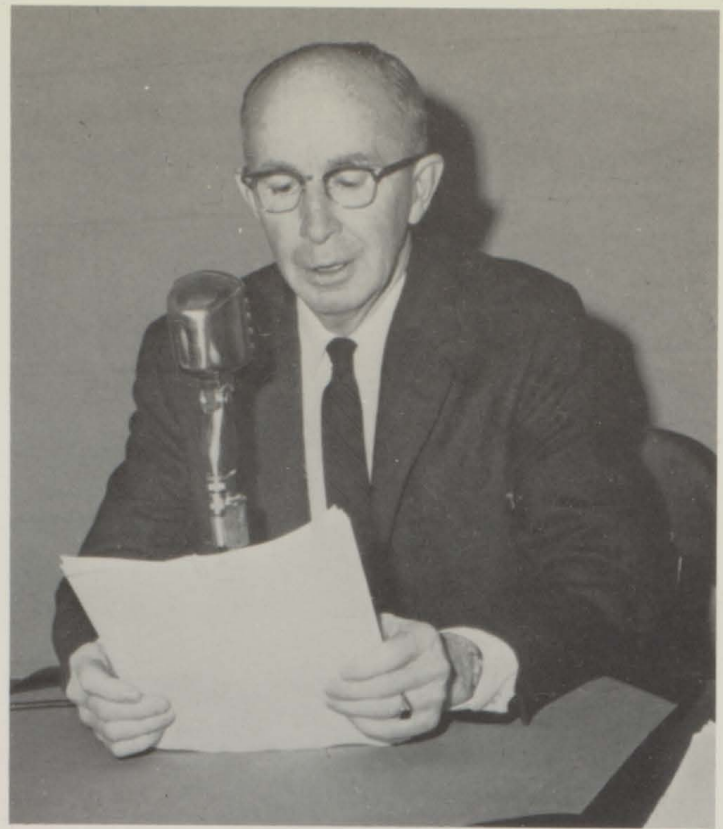
Cornerstones of the future are different, of course, in that they are the symbolic stones upon which we, as Americans, are able to build our individual lives.

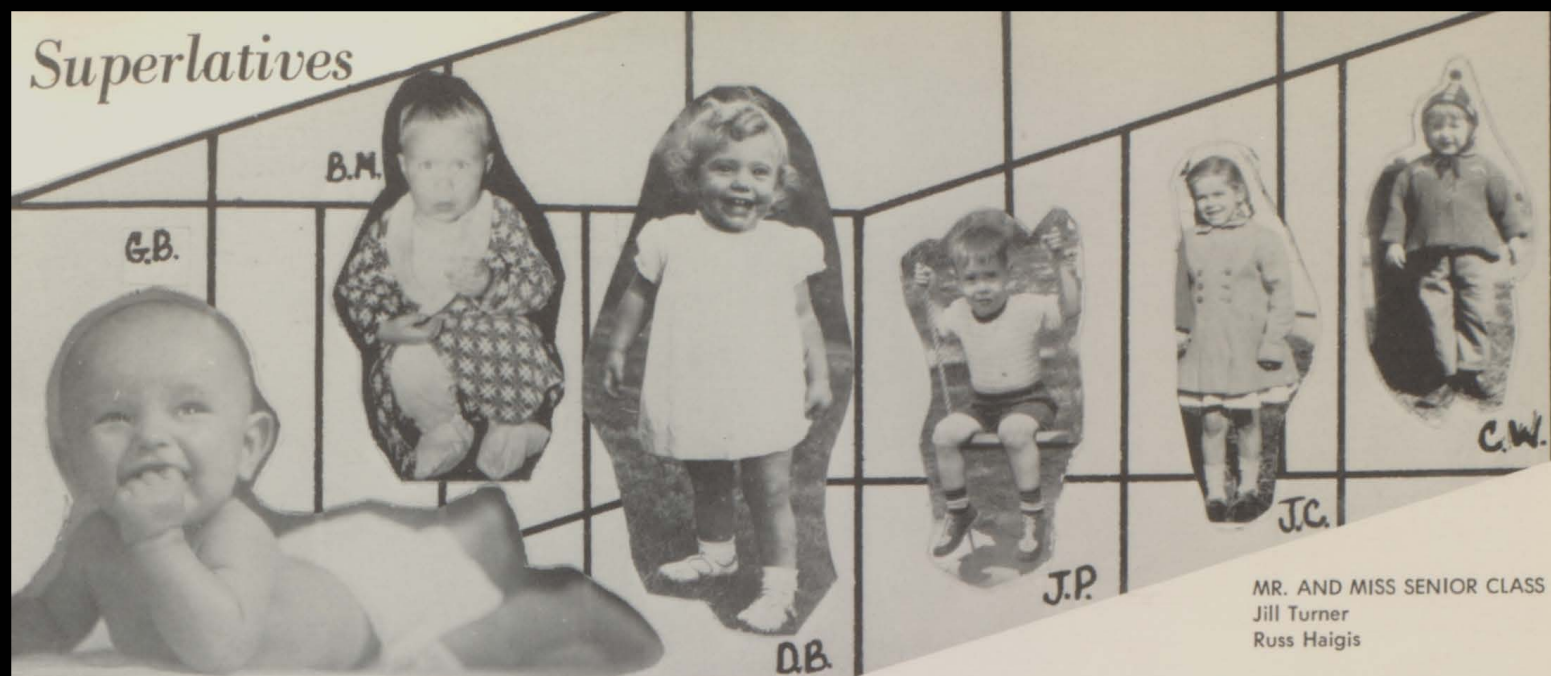
WHAT MAKES A '62 FRESHMAN?

WHAT MAKES A '64 JUNIOR

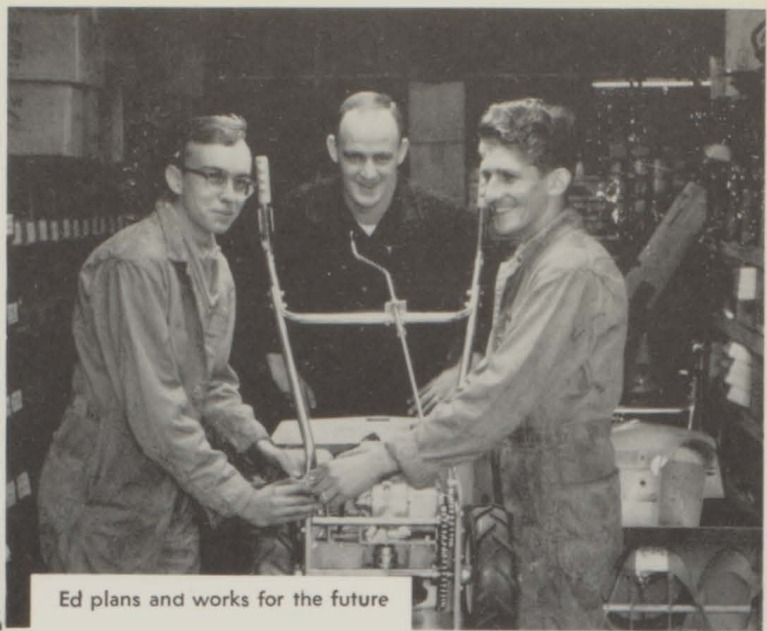

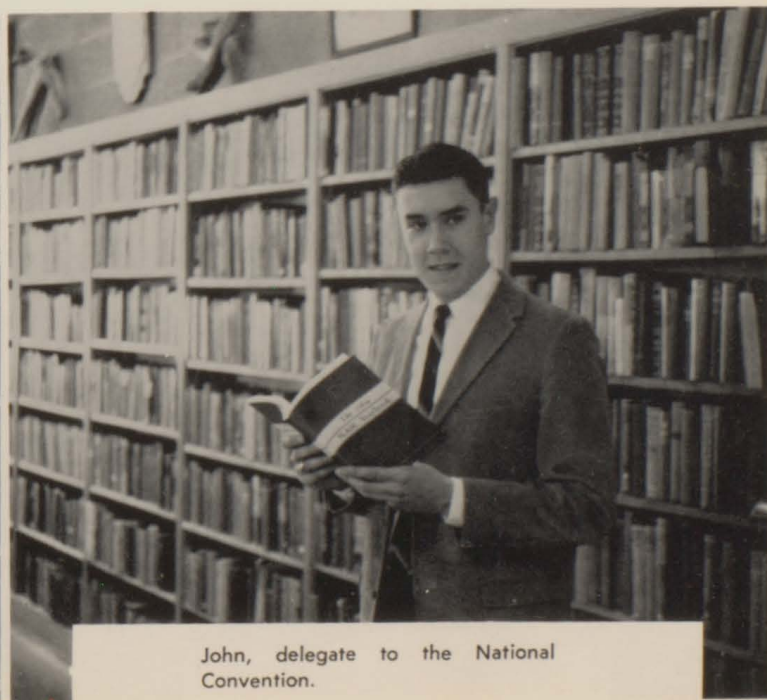
Student Council

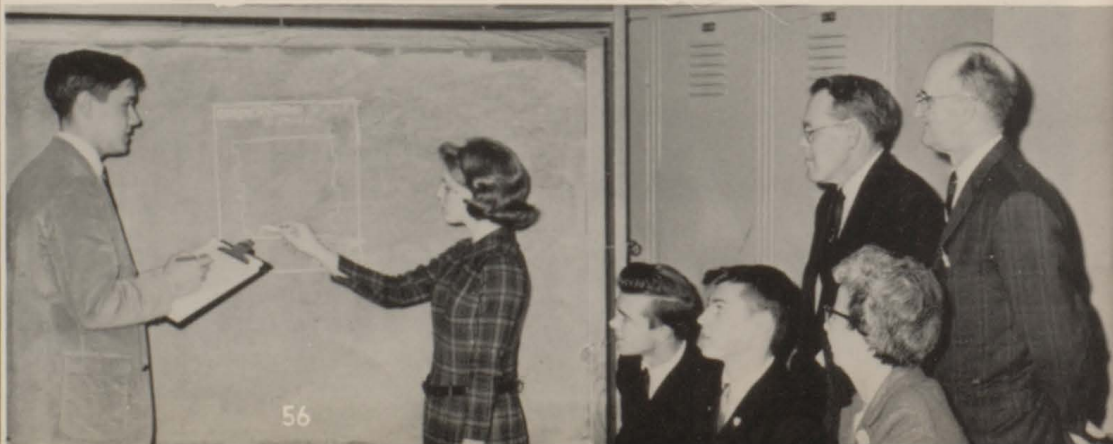
