The Class of '65



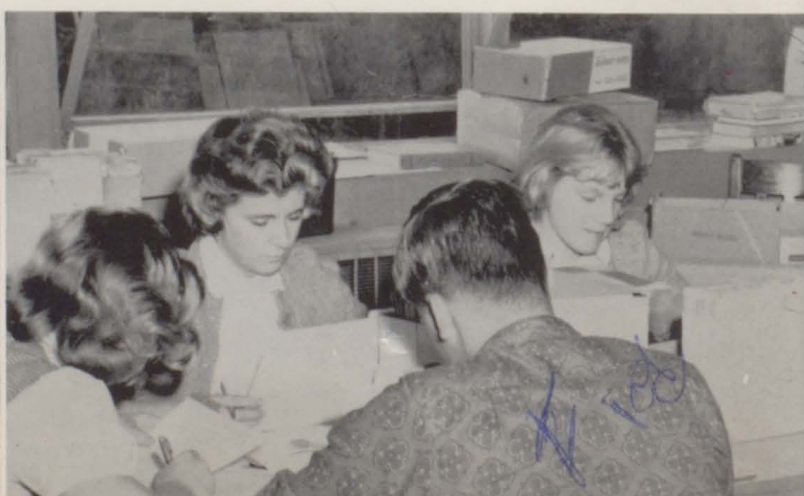
The Day—Wednesday, September 6. The Time—approximately 8:00 a.m. The Event—the first day of high school for the Class of '65.

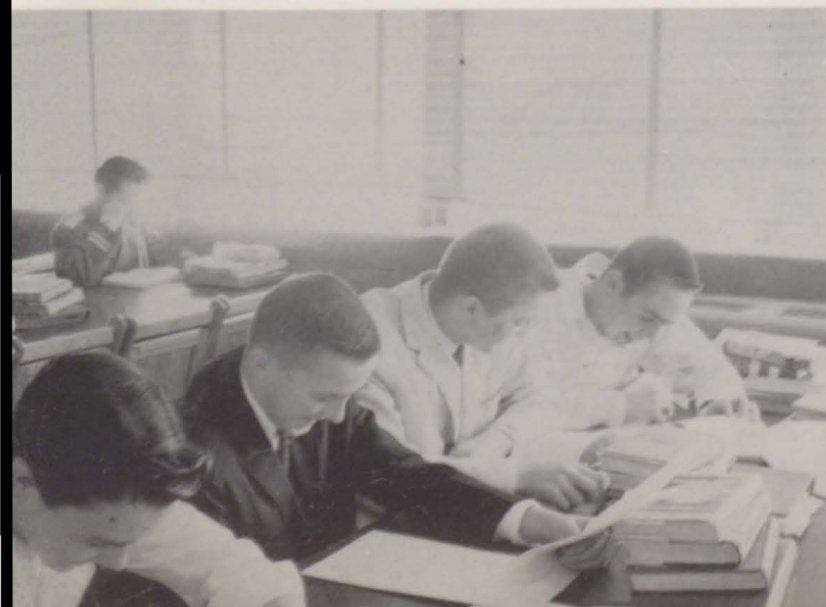
and Tolerates Work.

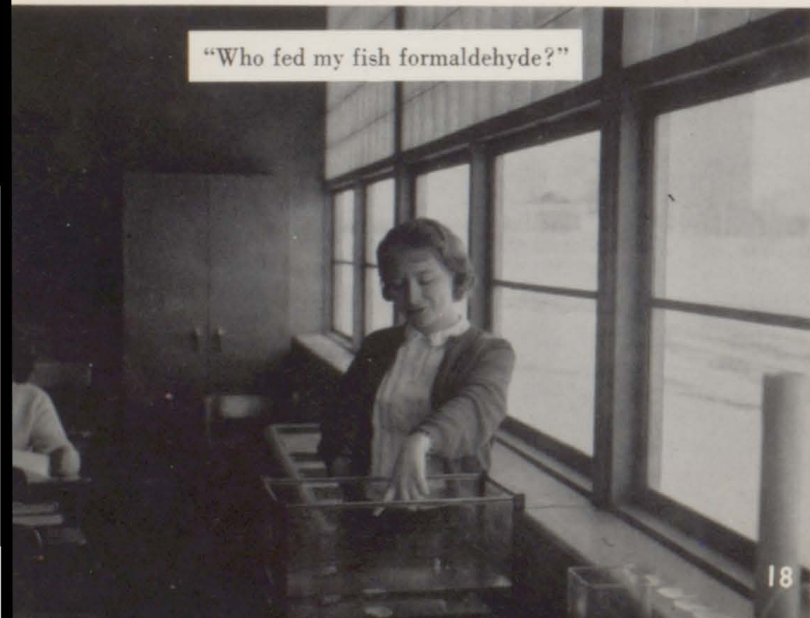

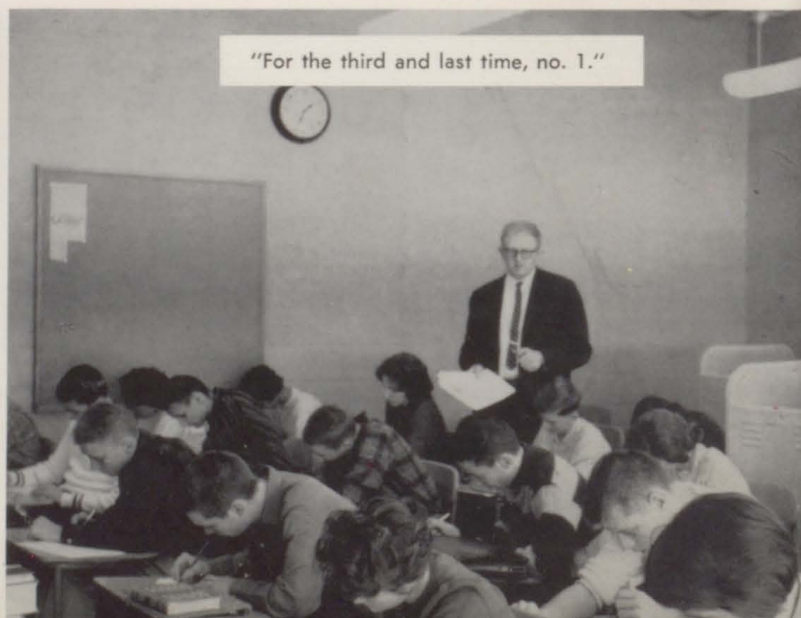
The Class of ...

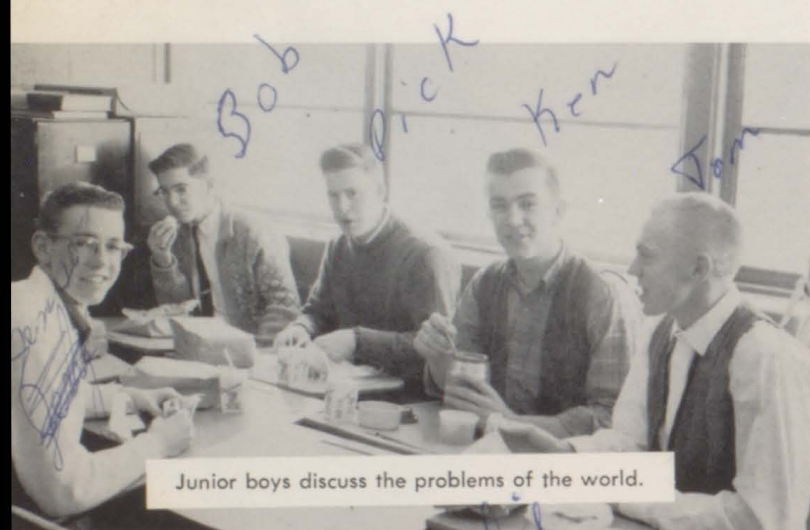
The Class of 1963 . . .

The boys and girls were both well represented at the Thanksgiving Day assembly. As is the usual custom, the speakers presented many interesting inter-





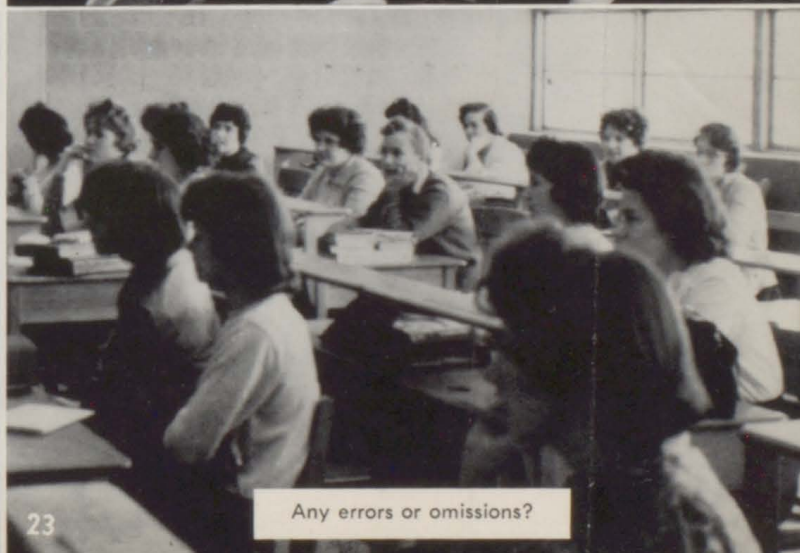
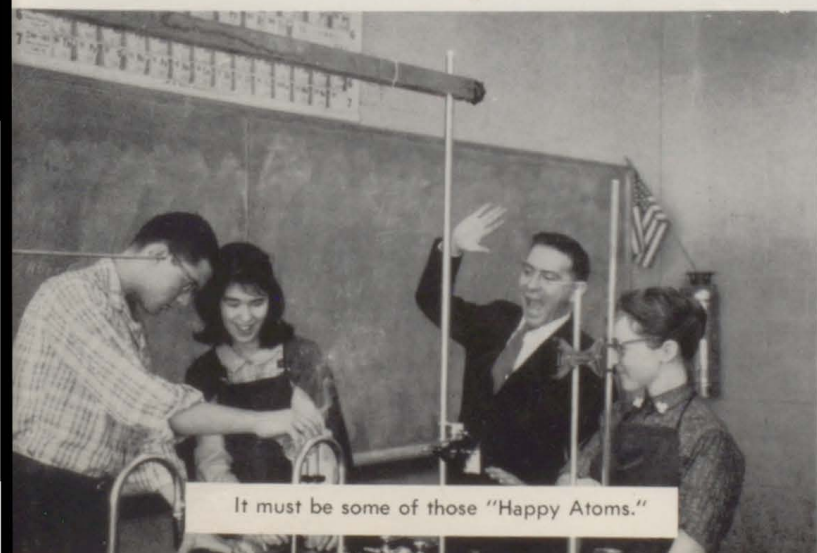

We would like to present a calendar of events for the Junior Class to show how much they have worked (?) this year in each of the divisions.

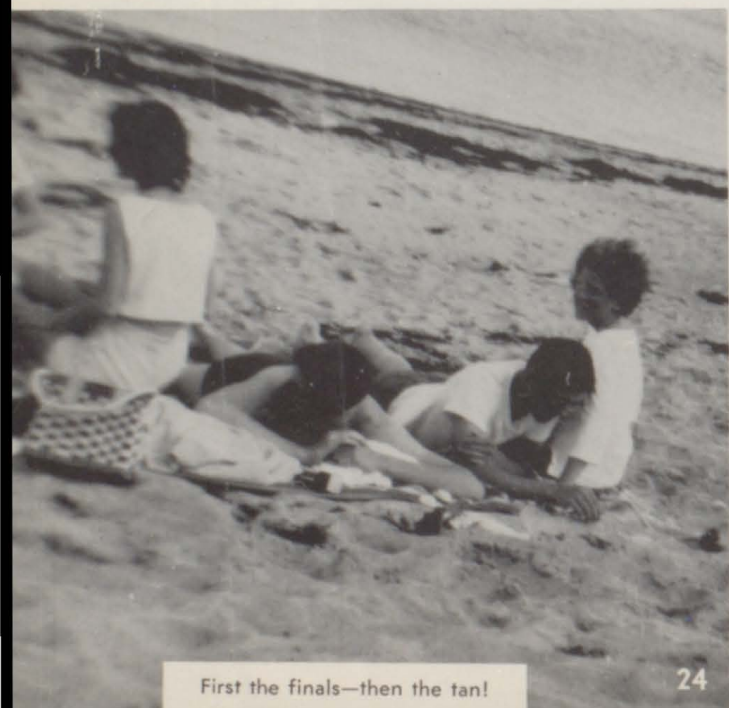

FALMOUTH — Scarborough High grabbed the lead in the second period here Thursday night and held it all the way to post a 57-47 Triple C victory over host Falmouth.

Trailing by an 8-12 margin at the end of the first period, the visiting Redskins came back to take a 23-20 halftime advantage. Scarborough led at the three-quarter mark by three and held off Falmouth's attempts to wrest back the lead.

Dave Gutter with 20 points and Pete Haigis with 15 paced the Redskin attack. Rick Laney sparked Falmouth with 19 points. Teammates Fred Richards and Jim Bickford each pitched in ten.

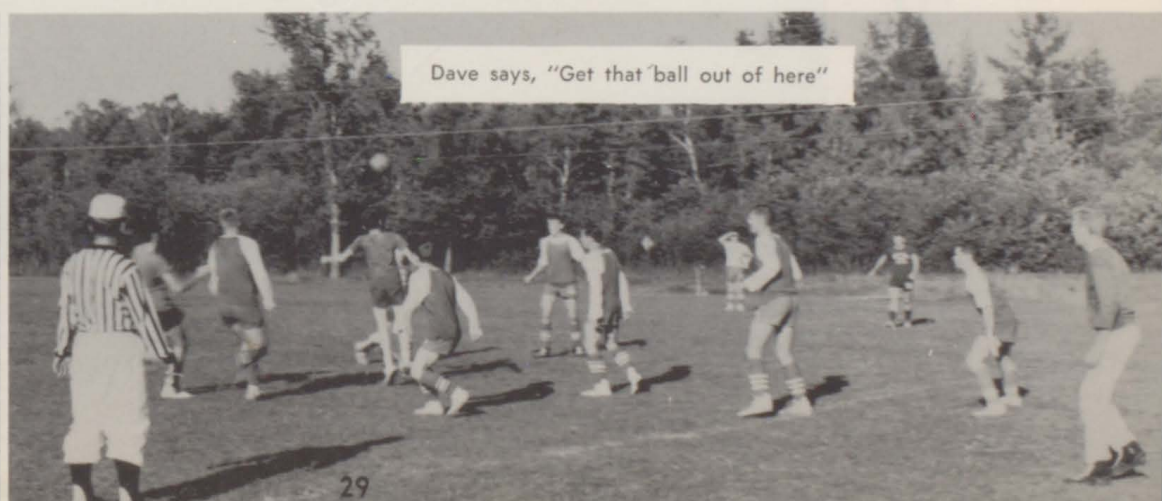
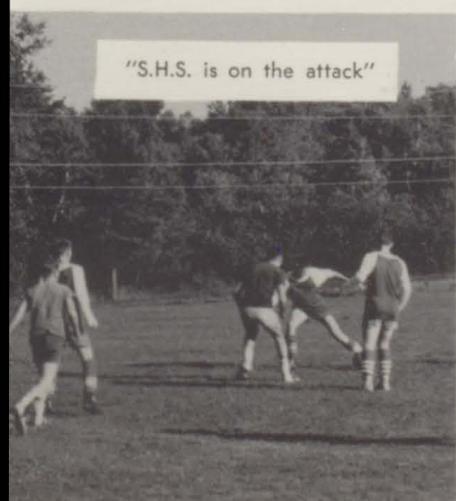
Soccer

Varsity Hoopsters and Whoopsters

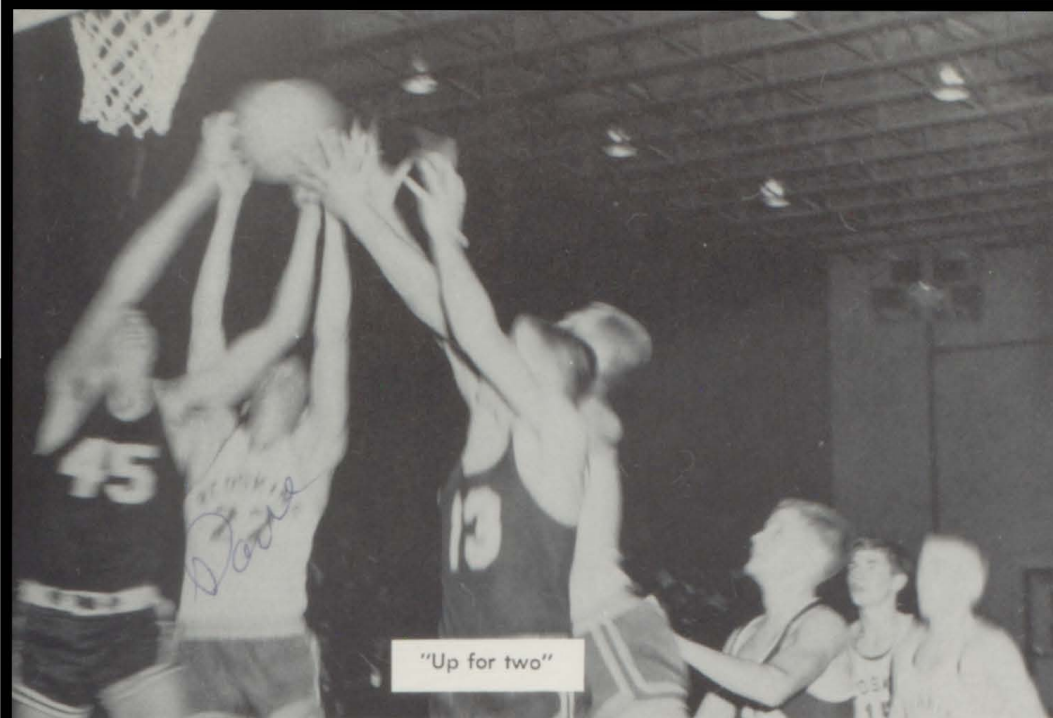

Library Staff

Scarborough High's library is growing both in quantity and quality. Trained librarians work under the direction of Mrs. Heywood (who is secretary of the New England School Librarians, Congratulations!). For the first time we take advantage of the American Association for the Advancement of Science Lending Library. The AAAS loans the library 50 books every two months. Our library of 4,000 titles, 2500 of them reference and non-fiction, 25 current periodicals and 3 daily newspapers, loans more than 35 to students daily.

The projection staff is playing an ever-increasing part in the school curriculum as their audio-visual aids are used more and more by the faculty members. These efficient boys, through Mr. Howard's scheduling, operate the movie projector, record player, slide projector, and tape-recorder for any teacher at any time during the school day.
