Dear Sir

Some time since I received a request from you, thro' Miss Thomson, for any facts or incidents connected with Dr. Parish in Scarborough.— I was unable at the time to comply with your request, to my regret. In looking of late over letters & papers to destroy them of my late Father, Rev N. G. Dolson, I found the notices enclosed, which he had collected with much interest. They were used by Williamson in his "History of Maine" also by Dolson in "History of Scarborough"

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also can be seen in Southgate's Book on Scar" & in some volume of the Historical Soc" records in Bottarel Library. I supposed they were destroyed by him in his last days. On looking them over slightly I thought they might be of service to you, if you still intend to carry out your idea of writing Annals of that old town in its bygone days. I send all the papers & the minutes & scraps just as they were left - some are illegible, to me aged eyes but lawyers are supposed like Printers, Editors, to decipher all penwork. If, on inspection you find them of no avail to you - please burn them out & don't wish them returned. My Brother headed a Petition to the Court in 1844, for permit to

take down the Meeting House which was granted. Steel fallen into decay, its many windows a target for boys slings. The land reverted to heirs of the donor.

Mrs Rebecca Collins nee Burnham. It was built in 1799. Mr. Dillon was ordained, the house dedicated 10th Dec. 1800. No longer "House" has replaced it the Society disbanded with other sects or died out.
